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Management Discussion of Fund Performance

June 5, 2023

This Management Discussion of Fund Performance presents the portfolio management team's view on the significant factors and developments that have affected the ETF's performance and outlook in the year ended March 31, 2023 (the "period"). If the ETF was established during the period, "period" represents the period since inception.

In this report, "Mackenzie" and "the Manager" refer to Mackenzie Financial Corporation, the manager of the ETF. In addition, net asset value ("NAV") refers to the value of the ETF as calculated for subscription and redemption purposes, on which the discussion of ETF performance is based.

Investment Objective and Strategies

The ETF seeks diversification, long-term capital appreciation and potential for income by investing primarily in a diversified portfolio of alternative asset classes, including non-traditional equity and fixed income securities of issuers located anywhere in the world, currencies and commodities.

Risk

The risks of the ETF remain as discussed in the ETF's Prospectus.

The ETF is suitable for medium-term investors looking for a diversified portfolio of non-traditional asset classes to hold as part of their balanced portfolio, who can handle the volatility of stock and bond markets, and who have a low to medium tolerance for risk.

Results of Operations

Investment Performance

During the period, the ETF returned -9.5% (after deducting fees and expenses). This compares with a return of -1.7% for a blended index composed of a 60% weighting in the ETF's broad-based index, the MSCI World (Net) Index (returned 0.6%), and a 40% weighting in the ICE BofA Global Broad Market (Hedged) Index (returned -5.4%). All index returns are calculated on a total return basis in Canadian dollar terms. Investors cannot invest in an index without incurring fees, expenses and commissions, which are not reflected in the index returns.

Global equities fell over the period as economic forecasts weakened, although currency movements generally boosted returns in Canadian dollar terms. Employment remained strong. In response to persistently high inflation, the U.S. Federal Reserve and the European Central Bank increased their policy rates significantly. Higher interest rates contributed to a crisis in the U.S. banking system in March. In fixed income, global yields rose sharply. Volatility in fixed income markets was heightened by the magnitude of central bank policy actions and by geopolitical tensions.

Within the MSCI World (Net) Index, Denmark, Ireland and Spain were the strongest-performing markets in Canadian dollar terms, while Norway, Israel and Canada were the weakest. The energy, consumer staples and industrials sectors were the strongest performers, while real estate, communication services and consumer discretionary were the weakest.

The ETF underperformed both the broad-based index and the blended index, with overweight exposure to the real estate sector and to mortgages detracting from performance. Given the ETF's mandate, the return of the blended index is a more meaningful comparison.

Within the equity portion of the ETF, stock selection in Canada and the United States also detracted from performance, as did holdings in business development companies in the financials sector. Conversely, an overweight position and stock selection in the materials sector contributed to performance, as did overweight exposure to the energy sector.

Hedging of foreign currency exposure in the equity portfolio detracted from performance as a result of the overall appreciation of the hedged currencies relative to the Canadian dollar.

Within the fixed income portion of the ETF, holdings in emerging market bonds detracted from performance. Holdings in government bonds contributed to performance, as did holdings in term loans.

Over the period, the portfolio management team repositioned the ETF to reduce the economic sensitivity of the portfolio and take advantage of higher interest rates. The team decreased exposure to equities, increased exposure to fixed income and increased the ETF's cash position. Within the equity portion of the ETF, exposure to the utilities sector increased, and exposure to the materials, financials and industrials sectors decreased. Within the fixed income portfolio, exposure to foreign government bonds increased, particularly local currency emerging market debt based on the high real yields in those markets and the strong U.S. dollar. Exposure to term loans, which have floating rates, was increased to reduce the portfolio's sensitivity to interest rates.

Net Assets

The ETF's net assets decreased by 44.0% during the period to \$2.4 million. This change was composed primarily of \$0.4 million in net losses (including any interest and/or dividend income) from investment performance, after deducting fees and expenses, and a decrease of \$1.5 million due to net unitholder activity (including sales, redemptions and cash distributions).

At March 31, 2023, 18.8% of the ETF's NAV was held as inventory by the ETF's designated broker primarily for the purpose of sales to investors in the secondary market. As a result of these investments, the ETF is subject to large transaction risk as discussed in the Prospectus. Mackenzie manages this risk to reduce the possibility of any adverse effect on the ETF or on its investors, through such processes as settling transactions in kind, charging creation and/or redemption fees for transactions settling in cash, and establishing appropriate order cut-off times for transactions.

Recent Developments

The portfolio management team believed the market was underpricing the risk of sustained elevated inflation at the end of the period, and the team's outlook on the economy and company earnings was more bearish than the market consensus.

Although real assets such as commodities, real estate and infrastructure are part of the ETF's mandate, the team is selective in its exposures. At period-end, real estate investment trusts were attractively valued, in the team's opinion, though market sentiment remained weak. The team believes infrastructure is a less cyclical sector with good inflation dynamics. Gold bullion remained the ETF's largest direct commodity allocation, both as an inflation management tool and as a hedge against market volatility and U.S. dollar depreciation.

Effective March 31, 2023, KPMG LLP was appointed as the auditor of the ETF.

Related Party Transactions

Management Fees

The management expense ratio ("MER") for the ETF during the year ended March 31, 2023, was similar to the MER for the year ended March 31, 2022. Total expenses paid vary from period to period mainly as a result of changes in average assets in the ETF. The MERs are presented in the *Financial Highlights* section of this report. The ETF paid management fees to the Manager at the annual rate of 0.45%.

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The management fee for the ETF is calculated and accrued daily as a percentage of its NAV. The ETF's management fees were used by the Manager to pay for the costs of managing the investment portfolio of the ETF, including providing investment analysis and recommendations, making investment decisions, making brokerage arrangements for the purchase and sale of the investment portfolio and providing other services, and to pay for all costs and expenses (other than certain specified fund costs as more fully described in the Prospectus) required to operate the ETF.

Other Related Party Transactions

During the period, the ETF received \$0.003 million in income distributions from investments in other ETFs managed by Mackenzie to offset fees paid within those ETFs. There is no assurance that these distributions will continue in the future.

The Manager relied on an approval provided by the Mackenzie Funds' Independent Review Committee to appoint KPMG LLP as the auditor of the ETF, effective March 31, 2023.

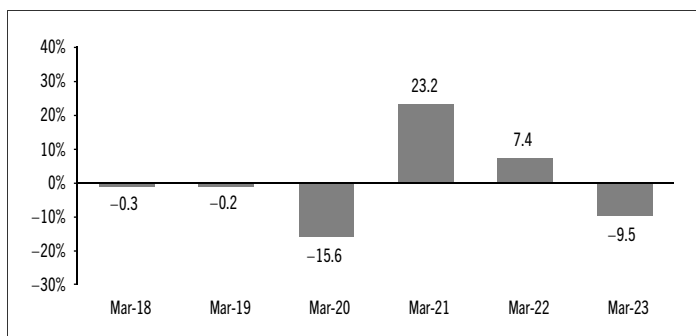
Past Performance

The ETF's past performance information is presented in the following chart and table. It assumes all distributions made by the ETF in the periods presented are reinvested in additional units of the ETF. The chart and table do not take into account brokerage commissions or income taxes payable by any investor that would have reduced returns. The past performance of the ETF is not necessarily an indication of how it will perform in the future.

If you hold this ETF outside of a registered plan, income and capital gains distributions paid to you increase your income for tax purposes whether paid to you in cash or reinvested in additional units of the ETF. Annual Compound Returns

Investors cannot invest in an index without incurring fees, expenses and commissions, which are not reflected in these performance figures.

All index returns are calculated in Canadian dollars on a total return basis, meaning that all dividend payments, interest income accruals and interest payments are reinvested.

The blended index is composed of 60% MSCI World (Net) Index and 40% ICE BofA Global Broad Market (Hedged) Index.

The MSCI World (Net) Index represents large- and mid-cap equity performance across 23 developed markets. Net total returns are calculated after the deduction of withholding tax from the foreign income and dividends of its constituents.

The ICE BofA Global Broad Market (Hedged) Index tracks the performance of investment grade debt publicly issued in major domestic and eurobond markets, including sovereign, quasi-government, corporate, securitized and collateralized securities. Qualifying bonds must be rated "BBB" or higher and have a remaining term to maturity of at least one year. The foreign currency exposure is hedged to the Canadian dollar.

- (2) Management expense ratio ("MER") is based on total expenses, excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs, income taxes and withholding taxes, for the stated period and is expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net assets during the period, except as noted. If the ETF was established in the period, the MER is annualized from the date of inception to the end of the period. Where the ETF directly invests in securities of another fund (including other ETFs), the MER presented for the ETF includes the portion of MERs of the other fund(s) attributable to this investment. Any income distributions received from ETFs managed by the Manager, with the intention of offsetting fees paid within those ETFs but which are not considered to be duplicative fees under regulatory requirements, are treated as waived expenses for MER purposes. The Manager may waive or absorb operating expenses at its discretion and stop waiving or absorbing such expenses at any time without notice.
- (3) The trading expense ratio ("TER") represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net assets during the period. Where the ETF invests in securities of another fund (including other ETFs), the TER presented for the ETF includes the portion of TERs of the other fund(s) attributable to this investment. The Manager may reimburse the ETF for certain brokerage commissions and other transaction costs (including those payable to the custodian or its agents). The Manager may make these reimbursements at its discretion and stop these reimbursements at any time without notice.
- (4) The ETF's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the ETF's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the ETF buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher the ETF's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the ETF in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of the ETF. The portfolio turnover rate is not provided when the ETF is less than one year old.
- (5) Closing market price, or the midpoint of the bid and ask prices in the absence of a closing market price, on the last trading day of the period as reported on the Toronto Stock Exchange.
